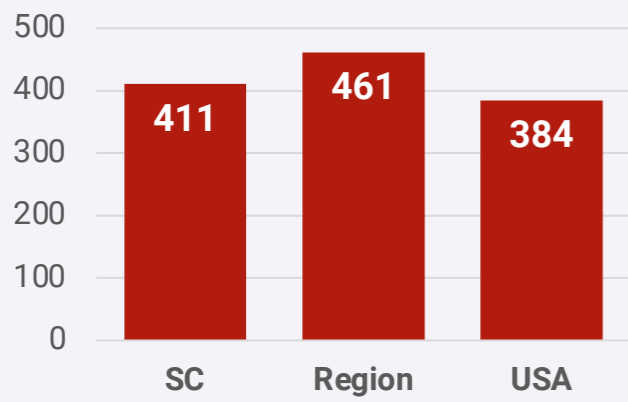


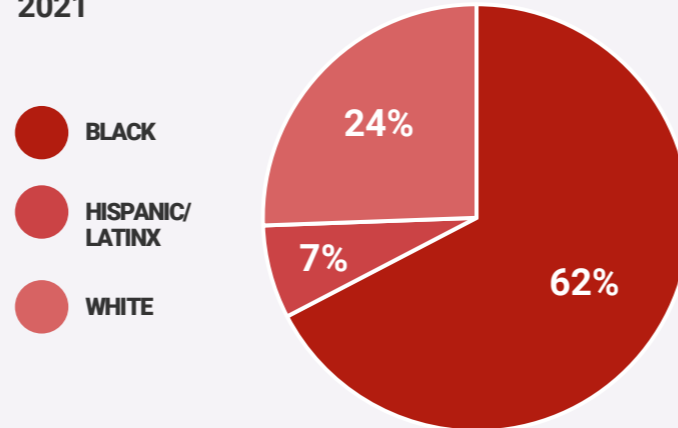
HIV IN SOUTH CAROLINA

In 2021, there were **18,109** people living with HIV in South Carolina. That same year, **652** people were newly diagnosed with HIV.

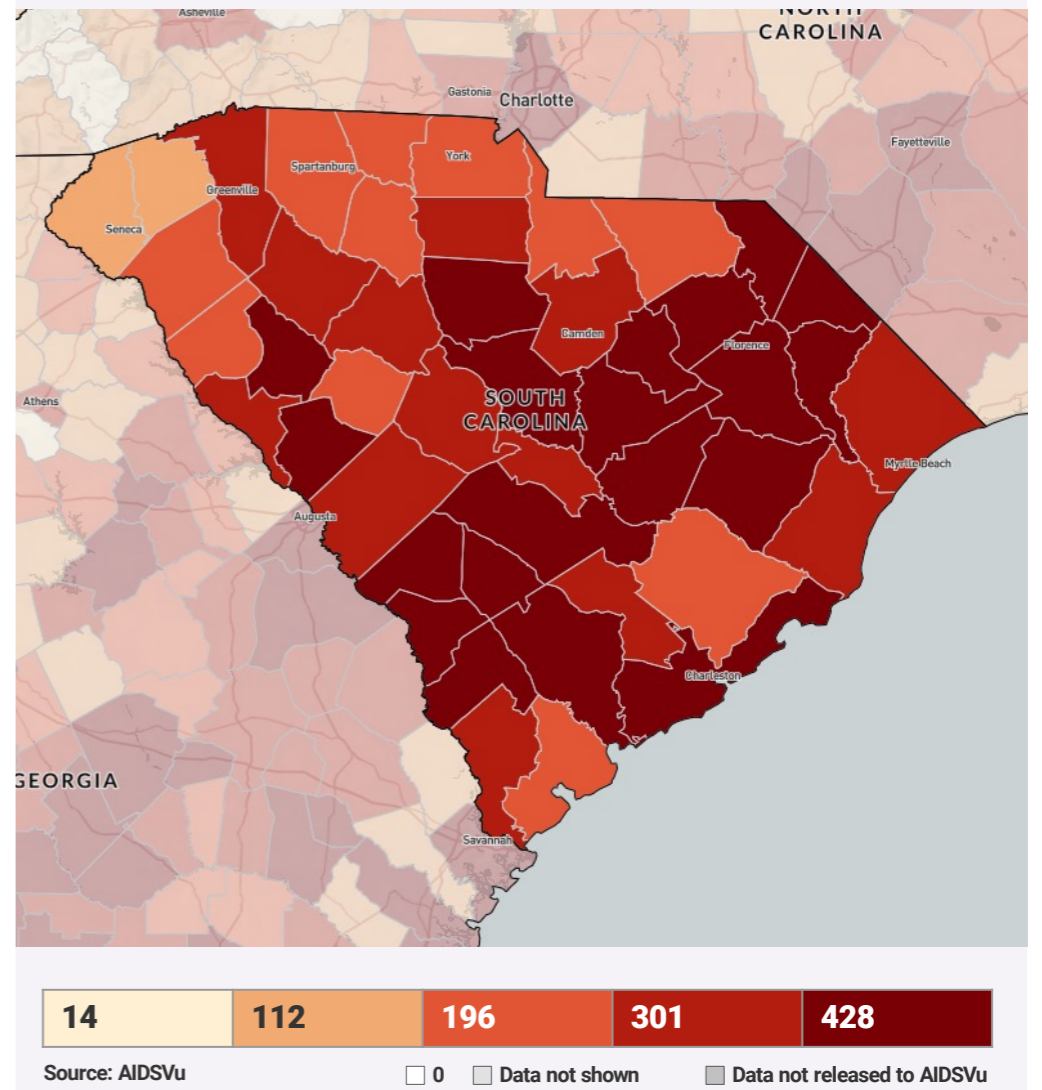
Rate of people living with HIV per 100,000 population, by Geography, 2021



Percent of people living with HIV in South Carolina, by Race/Ethnicity, 2021



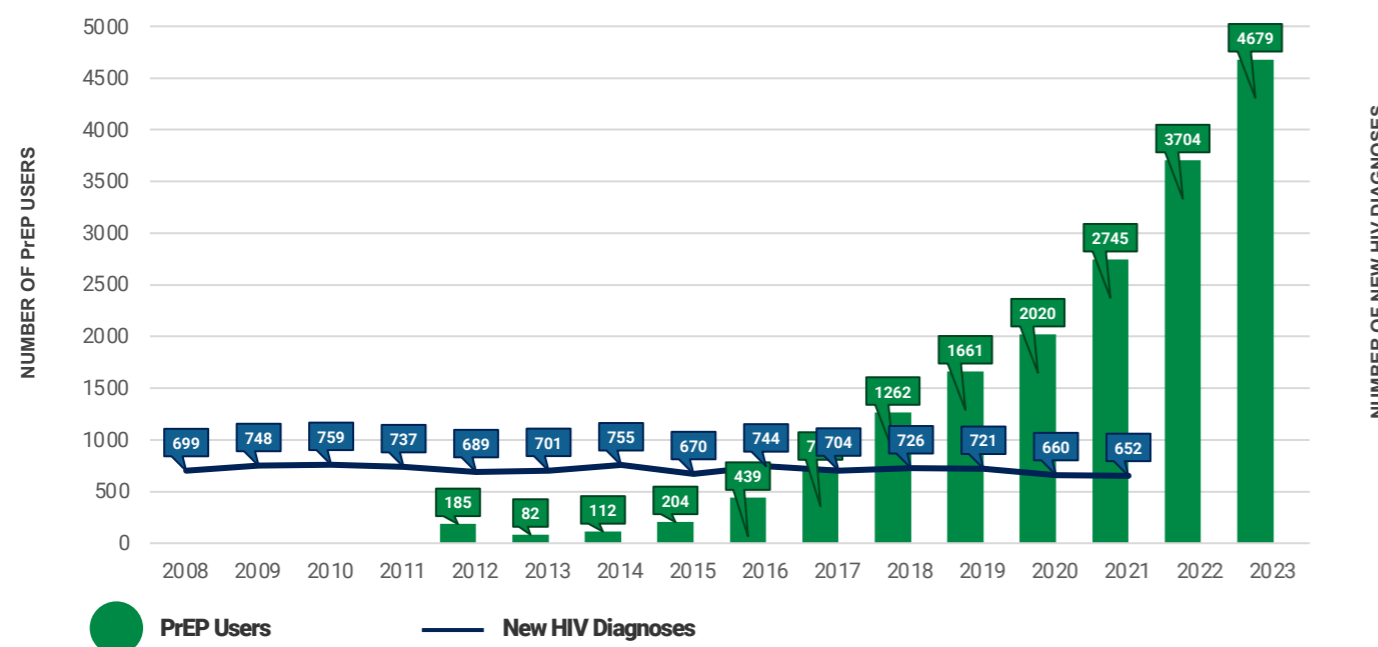
Rates of Persons Living with HIV per 100k, 2021



New HIV Diagnoses & PrEP Use

Pre-exposure prophylaxis, or PrEP, can protect people from acquiring HIV. We know that PrEP works in reducing new HIV diagnoses. Yet, PrEP use is not equitable. For example, **Black people represented half (49%) of new HIV diagnoses in the South, yet were only 21% of PrEP users in the region.**

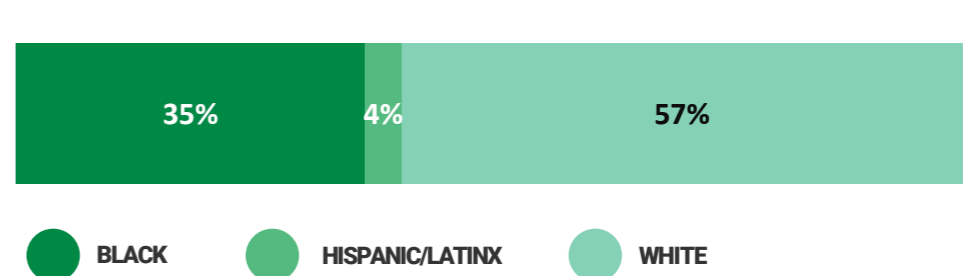
Number of PrEP Users in South Carolina, 2012-2023 vs. Number of New HIV Diagnoses in South Carolina, 2008-2021

Viral HIV Suppression

Viral suppression is defined as those living with diagnosed HIV who had suppressed HIV viral load (<200 copies/mL).

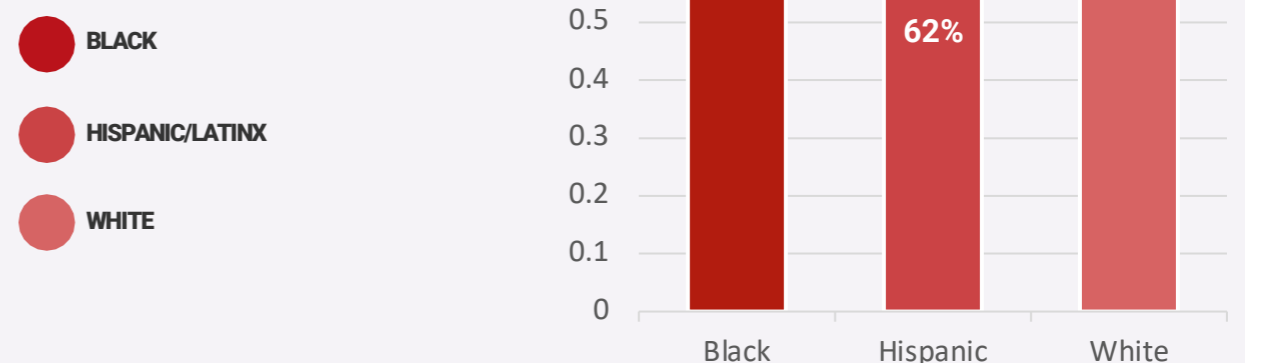
